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It has been great to be back on campus and to reintroduce our community to the pleasures and possibilities of in-person activities at the Writers House.

We hosted more than one hundred in-person public events at the Writers House this past year, many of them produced in the Arts Café, with its robust (and whisper-quiet) air handling, fantastic sound system, flexible theatrical lighting, and the capacity to livestream with a few simple clicks. We've never been more grateful for the top-to-bottom renovation of the old front parlor, which was completed in 2019. The Arts Café is welcoming, tech-forward, and ready for all the possibilities our community can imagine.

People gathered in the garden for shared meals, including a once-in-a-lifetime dinner cooked by chef Gabrielle Hamilton, who joined us for a reunion of the 2020–2021 Fellows Seminar. The Wexler Studio reopened for special recordings and podcasts, including the long-running podcast PoemTalk, which returned to the studio to record its 176th episode. Students rediscovered the second-floor Lipson Student Project Space as an ideal spot for craft projects, magazine production, free printing, and occasional naps. And our seminar rooms once again welcomed people for workshops, community-led writing exchange groups, knitting circles, editorial meetings, alumni visitors, and late-night discussions.

You can read about some of these activities in the pages of this *Annual*, though there's never enough space to describe it all. The Event Highlights section on pages 4–8 showcases a handful of public readings and conversations, including our inaugural Friedman Fiction Program, which

featured the eminent novelist Alice McDermott. On pages 8–9, we reflect on the remarkable impact of the Creative Ventures Project, which has been an engine of innovation at the KWH for a decade. The Digital Projects section on pages 12–13 describes a suite of interrelated online ventures that help us build and sustain a community of Writers House people stretching far beyond Philadelphia. We're especially proud to note that ModPo — our beloved free and open online course about modern and contemporary poetry — also turns ten this year.

Finally, in the last section of the Annual, where we name all of the Friends of the Writers House, without whom the Writers House simply would not exist, we announce our campaign to support the Kelly Writers House far into the future. The Possibility Fund (pages 32–33), to which anyone can contribute, will help ensure the permanence and sustainability of the Writers House and its creative community. We want our House of Possibility to exist for many generations to come. We hope you will want to help!

# TELL US WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW

▶ Our highly anticipated inaugural Friedman Fiction Program featured National Book Award winner **Alice McDermott**, who read an excerpt from an as-yet-untitled new novel — an evocative scene set in 1963 Saigon. Given the vast amount of writing and analysis about 1963, McDermott approached her story with a mixture of "fear and trepidation," but was determined, nevertheless, to make something new. To capture what she called the "tactile" experience of American women in Saigon in 1963, the smell and feel of it, the clothing the daily texture, McDermott read memoirs by corporate and military wives, whose experiences informed her writing. The resulting book — a rich, character-driven, epistolary novel - deftly presents a "woman's version of a fraught and complicated time in our history" and manages a fresh take by focusing on minute experiential detail, beautifully rendered. Faculty Director Al Filreis, who led a conversation with McDermott about her work, guided the conversation toward the craft of fiction. He invited McDermott to comment on advice to young writers from her book What About the Baby. If readers need something — a detail, some history — just tell them, McDermott said: "tell us what we need to know and get on with

your story."

#### THE LAST WORD

▶ On a sweltering night early in the fall semester, Marc Anthony Richardson and Vi Khi Nao read excerpts from their boundary-pushing new works for our Cheryl J. Family Fiction Program, a series made possible by **Cheryl J. Family** (C'91) that showcases up-and-coming fiction writers. We gathered in part to celebrate the release of Richardson's experimental novel Messiahs, which features a pair of unnamed protagonists in a romantic relationship. The powerful work grapples with the meaning of justice and punishment, and the lasting impacts of incarceration. Richardson explained his process: "Get everything on the page and then trim until it's right." About the ending of his novel, he said: "I didn't know what I was going to do until the very last word was written." Nao, who came with small sticker versions of her many book covers, read from a soon-to-be-published play and bits of short fiction and poetry, concluding with a microexcerpt from Fish in Exile. "It was overrated," she said, reading the one-liner with a hilarious, deadpan delivery. Everyone laughed in disagreement — the reading was, in fact, fantastic.

# THE BENEFITS OF COMMUNITY

► Co-sponsored by Penn's Creative Writing

Program, our annual Bob Lucid Memorial

**Program in Fiction** featured a star-studded

showcase of writers — Piyali Bhattacharya, Ariel Delgado Dixon, Stephanie Feldman, Carmen Maria Machado, Sara Nović, and Asali Solomon - all members of The Claw, a Philadelphia-based collective of women and nonbinary writers who are "making Philly a lit hotbed," according to our good friends at Philadelphia Magazine. The event was packed — full of writers and readers, many of them in town for the Association of Writers & Writing Programs (AWP) conference. KWH director **Jessica Lowenthal** (G'07) took the opportunity to brag about fiction writing in Philadelphia when she welcomed people to the standing-room-only event. Event emcee Carmen Maria Machado followed up with praise for the benefits of writing and working in community, a founding principle of The Claw and also of the Kelly Writers House. This was a fitting frame for our annual Lucid Program, which each year honors the memory of Bob Lucid, who helped dream up the KWH as an engine for building community.

#### **CELEBRATING SAM APPLE**

► We celebrated **Sam Apple** twice this year: as our Beltran Family Teaching Award winner, an honor he received after nomination from students, and for the publication of his new nonfiction book, Ravenous: Otto Warburg, the Nazis, and the Search for the Cancer-Diet Connection. Apple's exploration of Warburg's life and scientific work under the Nazi regime — part science reporting, part biography, part mystery — provides an astonishing account of how an eccentric, gay, Jewish scientist despised by the Nazis escaped extermination. In a lively discussion with the audience gathered in the Writers House garden, including many admiring students who came to cheer him on, Apple described the mystery of Warburg's survival and summarized the groundbreaking cancer research that helped keep him alive. The event was sponsored by Gary Wexler and Nina Wexler, who established a fund at the KWH to support programs that explore Jewish life and culture.

## WRITING FOR YOUNG ADULTS

▶ Our Arts at Homecoming event, sponsored by the Lucy F. DeMarco Fund for Youth Literature, featured two YA writers: Zachary Sergi (C'10), author of the interactive novel Major Detours, and Jennifer Yu (C'16), author of Four Weeks, Five People and Imagine Us Happy. KWH Director Jessica Lowenthal (G'07) moderated a conversation with Sergi and Yu about the ways they approach writing for young adults. Yu, who writes compellingly about teens struggling with mental illness, said that the formative topics of young adulthood, such as crushes and parent conflict, deserve serious treatment. Sergi agreed and noted that there's often a "feeling of discovery" that motivates writing for young adults and helps define the genre. The event concluded with Yu's advice for aspiring writers: "find welcoming spaces — including the Kelly Writers House — with other creative people to bounce ideas off of, to encourage each other, and to hold each other accountable."

# JAPANESE BREAKFAST IN THE HOUSE

▶ When word got out about the impending visit of Michelle Zauner — author of the heartrending memoir Crying in H-Mart and lead vocalist of the indie band Japanese Breakfast — we had to figure out a plan for packing in extra chairs. Zauner's connections to Philly's creative writing scene made this event, our sixteenth annual Blutt Songwriting Symposium, a special homecoming. It was also a lovefest for college writing classes. Zauner praised her mentors in Bryn Mawr's Creative Writing Program: "I would not be the writer I am today without that program and without Daniel Torday, specifically, and the care and generosity he brings to his class." Penn Creative Writing instructor Anthony DeCurtis, who hosted the event, led a

revelatory discussion with Zauner and invited her to perform a few songs, including "Kokomo, IN," from Jubilee, her third studio album. Our Blutt Songwriting Symposium was sponsored by Margo Krody Blutt and Mitchell J. Blutt (C'78, M'82, L'84, Trustee 1998–2008), who generously endowed the series in 2006.



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#### **GENERATION PANDEMIC**

▶ Near the end of the fall semester, Alan Jinich (C'22) and Max Strickberger (C'22) presented materials and findings from their "Generation Pandemic" project — an archive of interviews with young adults about the impact of the pandemic on their lives. Jinich and Strickberger conducted over eighty in-person interviews during an epic road trip across twenty-three states and 7,300 miles. To help ensure geographic and socioeconomic diversity in their project, the intrepid pair used Social Explorer, a demographic mapping tool, to plot their route. "We were looking for different kinds of places, big cities, tiny towns," Jinich explained in a Penn Today interview, "places with racial, ethnic, political, and religious diversity." Interview subjects included an overworked pharmacy tech worried about mishaps with medication, a member of the Navajo Nation who witnessed near-daily funerals, and the first person to contract COVID-19 in a small Utah community. In the discussion at the KWH moderated by project advisor Chris Mustazza (GEng'07, LPS'15, GR'19), Jinich and Strickberger described how they arranged and conducted interviews, including some of the more challenging aspects, such as convincing strangers to speak with them about deeply personal experiences.

#### **INAUGURAL LIU PROGRAM**

▶ In April we celebrated Tea with Ms. Tanzania, the extraordinary first novel of Fayyaz Vellani, a much beloved instructor in Penn's Critical Writing Program. The reading was the inaugural event in our newly endowed Liu Program Series, an annual series of events sponsored by Betty Liu (C'95) that is dedicated to writing about immigrant experience, border crossing, and the struggles and challenges of displacement. Vellani read three excerpts from his new novel, including a contemplative scene about a Black photojournalist in London sent to cover protests in the wake of a police shooting. Event host **Sara Byala** led a conversation with Vellani about the book, which touched upon themes of nostalgia, longing, and the pain of homecoming. "Going home again is fraught with disappointment," Vellani said. They talked about lighter subjects, too, such as how fashion ("feather earrings and slingbacks") can contribute to character development and how to make writing about geography "not boring." Vellani surprised and delighted his friends and fans with a lovely a cappella rendition of "Malaika," a traditional Tanzanian love song.

#### HALAL IF YOU HEAR ME

▶ Supported by a grant from the Sachs Program for Arts Innovation, poet Husnaa Haajarah **Hashim** (C'22) curated two events featuring poets from the anthology Halal If You Hear Me, a collection of writing that explores the diversity of Muslim experience. For the first event in the series, poets Safia Elhillo and Angel Nafis joined Hashim for a presentation of their work, followed by a conversation about their individual writing practices. To mark the special occasion, audience members received free copies of Halal If You Hear Me — which was edited by Elhillo and select titles by each poet. The second event was held on Zoom, where Ladan Osman joined Hashim for a reading and discussion. After the reading, Osman and Hashim spoke about ways to approach genre and disciplinary boundaries. Osman emphasized the importance of process, experiment, and discovery in artistic practice: "There's value in being an amateur in something," she said. Their conversation also touched on institutional hardships young Black writers face, and Hashim asked Osman for advice. "Hold onto your humanity," Ladan offered. "Being tethered inside of cooperation instead of competition will yield a lot more... it'll light the way behind you and ahead of you."



#### **CREATIVE WRITING** THESIS READING

► A celebratory in-person event in April gave graduating Creative Writing majors an opportunity to share excerpts from their honors thesis projects — long-form creative literary works in poetry, fiction, creative nonfiction, screenwriting, and hybrid genres. This year's crop of capstone projects included pandemic narratives, transnational reflections on immigration and difference, childhood portraits, and experimental poetic investigations into material culture. Creative Writing Director Julia Bloch (GR'11) and faculty advisors introduced eight thesis writers: Jamie Albrecht (C'22), Mehek Boparai (C'22), Alexander Sully Burns (C'22), Saranya Das Sharma (C'22), Quinn Gruber (C'22), Lulu Lipman (C'22), Laiqa Shariff (C'22), and Max Strickberger (C'22).

#### PERFORMING SCIENCE

▶ Members of the Excelano Project, Penn's spoken word performance group, invited Franny Choi to perform for this year's Caroline Rothstein Oral **Poetry Program**, an annual event endowed by Nancy Rothstein (CW'75) and Steven Rothstein in honor of their daughter Caroline Rothstein (C'06), who got her start as a performance poet at Penn. Choi read several pieces from "Soft Science," a series of Turing-test-inspired poems informed by artificial intelligence and automation that investigate identity and consciousness. Excelano Project co-presidents Ollie Dupuy (C'23) and Maressa Park (C'22) led a conversation with Choi, in part about her interest in science and how having a "beginner's mind" in technological topics might spark creative response. "I'm excited to introduce some of these concepts, which are still new to me," Choi explained. Audience members kept up a robust discussion for the duration of the reading and conversation using Zoom's chat function.

**BRODSKY GALLERY** 

The Brodsky Gallery is an art installation space integrated into the first floor of the Kelly Writers House, endowed by **Michael** Brodsky (W'88) and Heidi Hookman Brodsky (C'89). The Brodsky Gallery presented three fantastic shows this year,

including art by students.

- ► We opened the spring semester with *Late for* Revision, a series of small-scale graphite drawings by Jennifer Wroblewski (C'94) that explore "the space between drawing and writing." Artist Etty Yaniv led a conversation with Wroblewski about asemic writing, the similarities and differences between drawing and writing, and the concept of "revision."
- ► For our final gallery show of the year, Assistant Program Coordinator Heidi Kalloo curated Black Radical Comics, a show of comics by Ben Passmore, a Philadelphia-based Eisner awardwinning artist and activist. On display were two of Passmore's comics, City of Brotherly Riots, which documents summer 2020 protests in Philadelphia, and The Great Debate, which reimagines a 1959 debate between Martin Luther King, Jr., and Robert F. Williams.

- ► We celebrated the perseverance of two Heled Travel Grant winners: Grace Leahy (C'20), who chronicled the pandemic-driven disruptions to her original plan, and Ian McCormack (C'21), hospitals after a yearlong delay.
- ▶ Penn alumni joined us for an annual fundraiser in support of the KWH, held this year in memory of Paul Kelly (C'62, WG'64, Trustee 1997-2021). Featured presenters included Skye Lucas (C'21). who interned at the Flathead Beacon,

Creative Ventures launched in October 2011 with two events: our first ever Edible Books Party, a punny celebration of books and food, followed two weeks later by "Re:activism," a citywide game that explored Philadelphia's history of activism and public protest, developed collaboratively with colleagues from the Institute of Contemporary Art and Penn's Urban Studies Department.

These back-to-back events — creative, playful, interdisciplinary, ambitious, and community-oriented happenings — set the stage for what has become a transformational project at the Kelly Writers House. Supported for a decade with extraordinary generosity by Marc Wolpow (W'80) and Robin Wolpow, Creative Ventures has become a remarkable engine of innovation at the KWH.

Even a short partial list of the dozens and dozens of innovators and creative people who have visited the KWH thanks to Creative Ventures is astonishing. New Orleans city planner Kristina Ford brought designers, planners, and activists together to discuss the challenges of city planning in the aftermath of disaster. Architectural conservator Jessica **Baumert** met with students to describe the community engagement process that helped transform West Philly's historic Woodlands cemetery into a vital community resource. Novelist Naomi Jackson led a free, multiweek writing workshop for women of color. Andrew Whiteman of the indie band Broken Social Scene tested the technical capacity of our old, pre-renovation

Arts Café when he performed a multimedia reinterpretation of Alice Notley's *In the Pines*. Novelist **Siri Hustvedt** joined psychoanalysts, psychologists, and critics for a discussion of literature and psychoanalysis.

Creative Ventures has also enabled the Writers House to participate in a number of major, collaborative initiatives — projects that have brought people together in rewarding and sometimes challenging ways for interdisciplinary learning. Take for example Sam Apple's Entrepreneurial Journalism course, a unique in-curriculum class offered through the Creative Writing Program that encouraged students to develop new media platforms. Creative Ventures made it possible to award seed funding at the end of the course to help launch the most viable ideas. Or the ArtsEdge Residency **Project**, a six-year partnership with Penn's Facilities and Real Estate Services that offered yearlong residencies for emerging writers and artists. Creative Ventures made it possible for emerging artists to live and work in Philadelphia and contribute to the life of the Writers House, with presentations, workshops, and demonstrations of their practice for the benefit of the KWH community.

And Creative Ventures has helped our community make so many things! Gallons of chili for annual chili cook-offs, thousands of custom pinback buttons, a giant whale wrapped in cellophane, a non-alcoholic Pan Galactic Gargle Blaster, a recreation of the

feast from *Spirited Away*, food descending a staircase, hundreds of paper cats and fish (some of which are peppered throughout this *Annual*), and a whole bunch of T-shirts.

But the core of Creative Ventures has been to serve as an incubator and support system for a steady stream of intellectually adventurous student-led initiatives. Jenny Chen (C'14) organized a literary bike tour of Philadelphia. Tess Paoletta (C'16) created otherworldly images of Omega Centauri, an "unseeable" cluster of stars seventeen thousand light years away. Justin Sheen (C'17) traveled to the northernmost point in the US. Amanda Silberling (C'18) went on tour with the band Leggy to create a documentary about women in punk. Kaitlin Moore (C'18) tested astrophotography equipment in New Zealand. Davy Knittle (GR'20) launched an interdisciplinary series about poetry and the built environment. Josephine Chen (C'22) explored Chinese culinary heritage by recreating recipes from The Story of the Stone. Eva Lewis (C'22) organized a team of field researchers in Chicago to canvas residents about their access to resources. And the list goes on and on — with projects in film, photography, printwork, gaming, mapmaking, art criticism, sustainability, furniture reclamation, design, and more, all proposed and enacted by students.

- ▶ Cooperative economy advocate Jamila Medley (G'13, LPS'15) led a conversation with founding Hub member Andrew Zitcer (C'00, GCP'04, CGS'07) about cooperation as an antidote to inequality, based on Zitcer's book, Practicing Cooperation: Mutual Aid Beyond Capitalism.
- ▶ Led by Farah Sayed (C'23), the people of Equilibria magazine encouraged creative exchange between and among writers and artists.
- ▶ Members of the Fiber Arts Circle, organized by **Husnaa Haajarah Hashim** (C'22), convened weekly for informal crafting sessions and occasional field trips to Wild Hand, a Mount Airy yarn shop.

There's nothing quite like the Kelly Writers House Fellows Program, in which a combination of seminar classes and public events make every avid reader's literary dreams come true. Imagine sitting next to your literary hero at an intimate dinner party. Or chatting with an eminent novelist over coffee and bagels. Or joining a learning community of writers and readers, eager to talk with you about contemporary writing practices.

Supported annually since 1999 by the late and much missed Paul Kelly (C'62, WG'64), the Kelly Writers House Fellows Program makes all this and more possible, enabling members of our community to interact with some of the greatest living authors of our time. At the center of the program is the Kelly Writers House Fellows Seminar, a unique Penn class held at the KWH, where seminar students work collaboratively to learn about three eminent writers and then welcome those writers to join them for a series of conversations, events, and meals.

Our 2021–2022 Kelly Writers House Fellows were novelist **Amitav Ghosh**, poet and performance artist **Caroline Bergvall**, and memoirist, broadcaster, and sports columnist **Doug Glanville** (ENG'93).

In preparing to meet **Amitav Ghosh**, whose complex narratives explore national identity, colonialism, and climate change, students in the Fellows Seminar spent time discussing the responsibilities of the writer as witness. Conversation turned often to the importance of writing about the environment, as well as the role of individual accountability in relation to large-scale disaster. For many students, Ghosh's work

seemed an urgent call to action: "He reminds us that the time to sort our values is *now*," **Mehek Boparai** (C'22) said.

The class tackled similar themes — the role of ecocriticism in creative work, the role of the writer as an advocate for change — when they launched into the work of **Caroline Bergvall**, a poet and performer who experiments with sound, media, and visual art in her work. **Chelsey Zhu** (C'22) noted

that reading Ghosh and Bergvall back-to-back expanded her ability to discuss language in relation to migration. **Mehek Boparai** (C'22), **Kaliyah Dorsey** (C'22), and **Sruthi Srinivas** (C'23) invited classmates to consider Bergvall's experimental uses of language, media, and performance, which demonstrate how form and delivery can be as evocative as content.

The final Fellow of the semester was **Doug Glanville** (ENG'93), whose experience as a Major

League Baseball player informs his incisive

commentary and analysis about sports and culture. Students were inspired by Glanville's open and honest writing about personal experience, issues of access and opportunity in sports, and the lessons

we can learn from the baseball field. Graduating seniors found Glanvillie's memoir *The Game*From Where I Stand particularly compelling, especially the sections about coping with major life transitions. When he joined the class for a freewheeling discussion of his work, Glanville encouraged the group to welcome transitions as opportunities for positive change.

# IN MEMORY OF PAUL KELLY

"In 1999 Paul Kelly proposed the creation of an annual series of three major programs, connected to an undergraduate course to be held inside the Writers House, that would feature extended visits by eminent writers. This became the Kelly Writers House Fellows program, which Paul and Nancy Kelly funded with a generous grant each year. The Fellows program is about creating surprising intellectual intimacy, a sense of connectedness aligned with the feel of the old house itself, between students and writers so famous that the students could not have imagined the freedom to ask them difficult questions and receive thoughtful, honest answers. Kelly Writers House Fellows has been an experiment in creating a learning community that starts with the student and extends to an eminence, rather than the other way around. This idea is vintage Paul Kelly." — Al Filreis




► The brilliant and amazing poet **Laynie Browne** joined the KWH staff as the coordinator of "ModPo," our free open online course on modern and contemporary poetry led by Al Filreis and a team of dedicated teaching assistants. Starting in September, the ModPo team hosted weekly interactive webcasts — broadcast live from our Arts Café — that allowed students and teaching assistants from all over the world to participate in lively, real-time conversations about the course materials (via phone, Twitter, Facebook, Coursera forums, and socially distanced in-person discussion). Tech wizards **Zach Carduner** (C'13) and **Chris** Martin managed the complex, multiplatform configuration of the webcasts — and were especially relieved to return to the Arts Café and its sophisticated streaming tools.

Thanks to a special gift from longtime ModPo supporter Chris Forman, we've continued to work on an ambitious database to organize ModPo's sprawling collection of discussions, performances, and readings.

Many people pitched in to help catalog and tag thousands of entries in the archive, including Nicole Braun, Camara Brown (C'17), Ali Castleman (C'13), Mandana Chaffa (W'87), Sophia DuRose (C'21), and Max McKenna (C'10). And video editors Makena Deveraux (C'23) and Paul Burke produced a steady flow of new content to add to ModPo's vast — and growing — collection.

▶ Al Filreis convened our first ever Alumni Online Book Group back in January 2000, with a month-long discussion of short stories by Saul Bellow and Mary McCarthy. The program was a spin-off of Alumverse, an online poetry discussion group of more than 150 alumni that was conducted entirely via email from January to June 1996. The idea was simple, though perhaps unusual for its time: anyone with an email address could participate in this learning community. The project has been generously supported since 2006 by David Roberts (C'84), a book group participant and leader.

This year, David Roberts (C'84) and Al

**Filreis** teamed up to develop an entirely new kind of book group: a series of four ninety-minute seminar-style discussions on Zoom, each focusing on one remarkable short story. The basic principles of openness and accessibility remained the same, but we wanted to take advantage of new tools. We also organized the old-style, email-based groups as well. Jamie-Lee Josselyn (C'05) convened a group of high school students to talk about memoirs by faculty in Penn's Creative Writing Program. Kate Levin (GR'95) and Laura Zinn **Fromm** led a session about *These Precious Days* by Ann Patchett. And Ronald Metellus led a timely conversation via email about Zoom, online media, and our digital present, using the film Eighth Grade to launch the discussion.

► Students learn audio engineering and production in the Wexler Studio, an innovative space for podcasts, interviews, and audio experiments of all kinds.

Students in **Jay Kirk**'s Experimental Nonfiction course rotated through the studio in teams, recording a series of interviews and conversations about their work.

**Chelsey Zhu** (C'22) recorded material for her fledgling podcast *Love in College*, which takes a nuanced look at the dating stories of young adults.

Jerry Cai (C'24) conducted two interviews for the Penn Undergraduate Biotech Society podcast: one with Penn chemistry professor **Thomas Mallouk** about clean energy, and one with digital health entrepreneur **Denise Silber** on the future of virtual reality in medical practice.

▶ Launched in 2005 by Charles Bernstein and Al Filreis, PennSound is the world's largest online archive of recorded poetry. The site houses more than sixty thousand recordings of poets reading their own poems, many of them produced, segmented, or edited by students at the KWH under the guidance of PennSound's managing editor Zach Carduner (C'13). Co-director Chris Mustazza helps coordinate many of PennSound's special acquisitions, and editor Mike Hennessey publishes PennSound Daily, a newsfeed highlighting additions to the site.

A series of massive digitization projects kept the PennSound staff busy this year. Leah Baxter (C'21) and Chelsey Zhu (C'22) processed a collection of cassette tapes donated by Simon Pettet and Ben Tripp, including significant readings from the St. Mark's Poetry Project. Alex Moon (C'24) worked on a set of UC San Diego recordings provided by Michael Davidson. Yiwei Chai (C'21) worked on the website, managing the addition of hundreds of links to recordings housed by the Library of Congress. And Wes Matthews (C'23) segmented multiple full-length readings into individual poems, including readings by Doug Kearney, Amiri Baraka, and Diane di Prima.

We produced several PennSound recordings right here at the KWH. Poet Matvei Yankelevich joined Kevin Platt, Al Filreis, and Ahmad Almallah for a discussion of Yankelevich's latest book, filmed before an audience of students in our Arts Café. And John Richetti visited the Wexler Studio to record poems by T. S. Eliot, in a special daylong session engineered by our newest media staffer, Paul Burke.

► A collaboration of the Kelly Writers House, Jacket2, PennSound, and the Poetry Foundation, *PoemTalk* is a monthly roundtable discussion of poems from the PennSound collection moderated by KWH Faculty Director Al Filreis and edited by Wexler Studio Coordinator Zach Carduner (C'13). After an extended series of Zoom rooms and distanced Arts Café sessions, PoemTalk finally returned to live recording in the Wexler Studio, with two episodes slated to be released in fall 2022: PoemTalk #176, featuring a conversation with Carlos Decena, Dagmawi Woubshet, and **Abdulhamit Arvas** about John Ashbery's "Some Trees"; and PoemTalk #177, with Eric Falci, Charles Bernstein, and Julia Bloch (GR'11) on two poems by Maggie O'Sullivan.



▶ We rely on a stellar team of students to help us produce Jacket2 (jacket2.org), which publishes essays and commentary about contemporary poetry and houses several podcasts, including PoemTalk. With guidance from J2 editors Julia Bloch (GR'11) and Kenna O'Rourke (C'15), our dream team group of editorial assistants — Gabriela Portillo Alvarado (C'23), Quinn Gruber (C'22), Kendall Owens (C'23), and Sof Sears (C'23) worked on a sprawling assemblage of writing about EcoSomatics, a feature on Peruvian poet Roger Santiváñez, and a conversation among women poets of color celebrating second books. Along with editor Mike Hennessey, graduate student Knar Gavin (GR'26) pitched in as a developmental editor, helping J2 authors refine their essays for publication.



## **Summer Workshop for Young Writers**

On a muggy July evening, twenty high school students gathered in the KWH garden for the first meeting of our **Summer Workshop** for Young Writers, an intensive ten-day residential writing program. They came from all over — from as close as the Philly suburbs and as far as South Korea — to undertake an intensive writing journey together. Thanks to generous support from **Maury Povich** (C'62) and **Connie Chung**, who endowed the Summer Workshop in 2021, many students attended the program entirely free of charge, and over half received financial assistance to make it possible for them to come.

The group convened at the KWH every morning for memoir workshops led by Summer Workshop director Jamie-Lee Josselyn (C'05), followed by a rotating series of one-off afternoon craft sessions. Isaac Essex (C'20) encouraged students to consider found language as a source for new writing. Heidi Kalloo introduced everyone to Twine, an online tool for creating interactive fiction. Alli Katz

led a session on comics and cartooning. Davy
Knittle (GR'20) proposed strategies for writing
about place. Izzy Lopez (C'19) described ways
to incorporate fairytale and myth into memoir.
Kristen Martin (C'11) covered food writing
as personal narrative. Kaitlin Moore (C'18)
challenged workshoppers to address urgent
environmental concerns in their writing. Karen
Rile (C'80) led a session on narrative collage.
Jesse Schwartz (C'15) introduced a close
reading exercise to encourage close reading
as a way to approach writing. And Michelle
Taransky inspired the group to seek out
poetry everywhere.

The writing work was intense — but there was time for other kinds of exploration too, including a trek to South Street with a stop at the Magic Gardens, visits to the Common Press to learn about letterpress printing from Mary Tasillo, and a special info session organized by Penn Admissions.

Lots of people pitched in to help make the

Summer Workshop a success. Our core Summer these students in our direction.

Workshop staff — David Marchino (C'16),

Jesse Schwartz (C'15), and Wes Matthews
(C'23) — worked side-by-side with JamieLee Josselyn (C'05) to maintain an open and
welcoming atmosphere. Resident Advisors

the dorms (arranged with assistance from the
people of Penn Hospitality Services, including

At the end of the ten-day program, after intensive writing, revising, and discussion, workshoppers gathered all together once more for a final celebratory reading. Their performance was live streamed with help from KWH tech manager **Zach Carduner** (C'13) to families and friends all over the world, including some of the amazing high school teachers and writing mentors who pointed these students in our direction.

# Frost Valley residential summer camp

► Four Penn students interned at Frost Valley, a six-thousand-acre camping, conference, and environmental center in the high peaks region of the Catskill Mountains of New York State. Frost Valley offers a residential summer camp for children from a diversity of backgrounds and familial contexts, many of them away from home for the very first time. Over the course of nine weeks, our Writers House-affiliated Frost Valley interns lived and worked at the camp and experienced the importance of teaching creative expression in informal, dramatic settings, well beyond the walls of the traditional classroom. Pranav Mishra (C'24) worked with the development and marketing team, learning about nonprofit institutional storytelling and public engagement. Rebekah Donnell (C'24), Erica Messics (C'22), and Keemia Sarafpour (C'25) taught specialty classes including creative writing and theater arts as part of the "creative play" program team. These special internships at Frost Valley were supported by several Writers House funds this year, including the Sayet-Rosenberg Endowed Fund for Young Writers, the Faculty Director's Discretionary Fund, and the Esther T. Saxon Term Fund.



#### transcribez

Oneby facilitated transcribez, a writing workshop for trans and nonbinary youth that offers a safe and welcoming space for writing and discussion. Monthly meetings of transcribez took place on Zoom and featured workshops led by guest writers, including Nadia A., Kai Brookins, Marshall Green, Jamal Jones, and Casey Rocheteau. KWH Outreach Assistant Ollie Dupuy (C'23) helped with these special sessions by designing eye-catching fliers and promoting meetings on social media. transcribez was made possible thanks to support from Jerilyn Perman (C'91) and Brian Perman (W'90), who have sponsored writing initiatives for youth at the KWH for more than twenty years.

#### **Cosmic Writers**

▶ Students from the Revolution School visited the Writers House for a workshop on historical fantasy, led by KWH Outreach Assistant Rowana Miller (C'22). After an improv warm-up, students developed fantastical stories based on historical figures they'd studied in school. Their resulting tales included a magical culinary history and a story about what might have happened if Rosa Parks had been Medusa. The workshop was held in collaboration with Cosmic Writers, a 2022 President's Engagement Prize—winning creative writing education nonprofit that grew out of Miller's work at the KWH.

Jamie-Lee Josselyn (C'05), who leads our efforts to engage with high school writers, traveled to many schools and writing programs this year to meet with student writers in their hometowns, thanks to Alan Hartman (C'87) and Kim Hartman, who established an endowed fund to help us meet and recruit young writers.

Recruitment visits this year included trips to the Young Dallas–Fort Worth Writers in Texas; the Orange County School of the Arts in California; Benjamin N. Cardozo High School's Gateway Institute in Queens, New York; the Carver Center for Arts and Technology in Baltimore, Maryland; and the Hathaway Brown School's Osborne Writing Center in Cleveland, Ohio. We had some online meetings and info sessions too — with the Opportunity Network, *The Adroit Journal*, and WriteGirl.

Lots of people helped spread the word about the KWH and thanks to their collective efforts we engaged with over five hundred prospective Penn students this year. Dylan Fritz (C'25) and David Marchino (C'16) met with students and their families at the KWH. Peter LaBerge (C'17) connected with prospective students remotely, serving as an alumni ambassador for our learning community. A network of high school teachers and writing mentors directed their students toward Penn and the KWH, along with colleagues in Penn Admissions, including Crissy Iglesias and student tour guides. And our fantastic new Student Recruitment and Access Fund established by the Hartman family — sustained all of these efforts and more.

## **AWARDS AND PRIZES**

Beltran Family Teaching and Mentorship Award **Endowed Fund** ► Every year an outstanding teacher develops a special event or project at the KWH as the recipient of the Beltran Family Teaching and Mentorship Award. Sam Apple, our 2021–2022 Beltran Award winner, gathered a talented group of writers to celebrate the art of "noticing as a writer." Endowed in 2012 by John Paul Beltran and Lina Beltran.

#### The Kerry Sherin Wright Prize Endowed

**Fund** ► The Kerry Prize honors the literary communitarianism of Kerry Sherin Wright, the first director of the KWH. For his 2022–2023 Kerry Prize project, Ted Davis (C'24) will investigate everyday language use. Supported annually by the KWH community since 2003 and endowed in 2021 with a lead gift by Faculty Director Al Filreis. Additional gifts this year from Sheriza Baksh (C'07), Megan Bly (C'00) and Scott Wunsch, Lawrence Dark (C'81) and Alice Elliott Dark, Jessica Lowenthal (G'07) and Ryan Godfrey, and Deborah Miller and Stanley Strickberger.

Leslie Dezer Salmon and Ricardo Salmon Junior **Fellows Prize Endowed Fund** ▶ The Salmon Junior Fellows Endowment makes permanent the Junior Fellows Prize, a long-running prize that encourages young alumni to stay deeply connected to the KWH community and to develop their own creative work post-graduation. **Parker Prize Endowed Fund for Journalistic** Nonfiction ► The 2021–2022 Parker Prize, which honors excellence in student journalism, went to Alan Jinich (C'22) for "You never get that smell off your clothes," a multimedia piece about two cattle sorters in Texas and their work as essential workers during the pandemic. Terry B. Heled Travel and Research Grant **Endowed Fund** ► Thanks to the Heled Grant, which enables students to undertake significant travel-based research and writing projects, Drew Basile (C'23) will recreate Goethe's Italian tour and Sof Sears (C'23) will study the "death culture" of Paris. #### Universe in Verse Prize Term Fund

## **PROJECTS**

#### **Anonymous Digital Poetries Endowed Fund**

▶ This fund supports our efforts to archive, preserve, and make poetry and poetic resources freely available. In 2021–2022, the Anonymous Digital Poetries Endowed Fund supported three interrelated projects: PoemTalk, a popular podcast hosted by Faculty Director Al Filreis; PennSound, a vast online archive of poets reading their own work; and ModPo, a free open online course on modern and contemporary poetry. Endowed in 2022 by an anonymous donor.

#### The Brodsky Gallery Endowed Fund

► The Brodsky Gallery Fund enables the work of the Brodsky Gallery, an art installation space integrated with the first floor of the KWH. Brodsky Gallery shows this season included small-scale graphite drawings by Jennifer Wroblewski (C'94), documentary comics by activist Ben Passmore, and colorful birdhouses embellished by KWH community members. Endowed in 2010 by Michael Brodsky (W'88) and Heidi Hookman Brodsky (C'89)

**CPCW/PMA Seminar Fund** ► In the yearlong CPCW/PMA Seminar, a collaboration with the Philadelphia Museum of Art, students engage with visual art through critical and creative writing, while learning firsthand the processes of making, curating, and funding art. Taught by Kenny Goldsmith, the 2021–2022 seminar explored Walter Benjamin's The Arcades Project. The course culminated in a beautiful hardbound collection of student writing, co-published by CPCW and the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Supported this year by Matthew Abess (C'08) and Taylor Abess.

**The Creative Ventures Fund** ▶ The Creative Ventures Fund is a robust fund that enables KWH community members to pursue their most ambitious creative projects and ideas. The fund supported an extraordinary range of activities and happenings this year: public conversations and performances, print projects, art installations, interdisciplinary research, climate

justice work, online gaming, and more. Creative Ventures curators and practitioners included Anthony DeCurtis, who hosted a series of public conversations with musicians and culture critics; Farrah Rahaman (GFA'21, SPP'21, GR'29), who led a communal research project documenting the life of Trinidadian activist Claudia Jones; and Eleanor Shemtov (C'22), who launched the second issue of *t-art*, a magazine of art and technology. Supported annually since 2011 with a special gift from Nina Rosborough (C'14), Robin Wolpow, and Marc Wolpow (W'80).

#### **Endowed Fund for Feminist Projects** ► The

Fund for Feminist Projects supports projects that focus on gender, sexuality, and feminist thought. In 2021–2022, the fund sponsored a reading by Carlos Decena (C'95), the publication of Quake magazine, and a prize to Sof Sears (C'23) for a film about girlhood. Endowed in 2010 by an anonymous donor.

The Herman and Jeanne Robinson Letterpress **Endowed Fund** ► Through the Robinson Press, students discover and explore print culture in the Common Press studio, with guidance from press manager Mary Tasillo. Newly reopened after COVID-related closure, the press held dropin public printing days and created dozens of broadsides and postcards for KWH events, many of them designed by students. Endowed in 2010 by Nina Robinson Vitow (CW'70, WG'76) in memory of her parents Herman Robinson and Jeanne Robinson.

#### **Kelly Writers House Fellows Fund**

▶ The Kelly Writers House Fellows Program enables undergraduate writers to interact with eminent writers they greatly admire. 

#### Lucy F. DeMarco Endowed Fund for Youth


#### Sylvia W. Kauders Endowment Fund
