### **ROOF BOOKS**

Virtual Reality by Bob Perelman 80pp. \$9.95

"It's / 1991—at least it was, once / upon a time—and communism is / dead, leaving capitalism, the word, the // movie, the whole ball of idiomatic / wax, with nowhere to go, nothing // to mean. The free world belongs / in a language museum now, along / with free love and free verse."

Virtual reality is a computer-generated environment that seems real but isn't; Virtual Reality, the book, makes clear that the experience predates the technology. These brilliant and often hilarious poems expose the rotten scaffolding of the ideologically generated "private" world, and reconnect its elegances to their social and intellectual consequences.

The Boundary of Blur by Nick Piombino 120pp. \$13.95

The 18 essays in *The Boundary of Blur* are concerned with the complex interchange between writing, science and psychoanalysis, and chart the activities of a mind at work along, within and beyond the "boundaries" of these disciplines. These essays exhibit the patience and goodwill necessary to give the world and its complications the responses they deserve. They do so while



involving and implicating the reader in the very construction of their propositions. Piombino writes not as a tour guide ushering befuddled readers through the new poetries, but as an intellectual shaman evoking and applying their liberatory potentials.

Islets/Irritations by Charles Bernstein 104pp. \$9.95

A key work by one of America's most acclaimed and accomplished poets. *Islets! Irritations*, originally published in a limited edition in 1983, is a tour de force of literary thought and social/linguistic disruption. It is indispensible for anyone interested in significant postwar poetry.



Good Science, Poems 1983–1991 by Ken Edwards 80pp. \$9.95

"The drill sergeants break up the only road we've got / The angry woman rings it starts to rain / I state my case on the basis of need / You shoot it down on the basis of want." In Good Science Edwards has written one of the truly powerful books of poetry to come out of England in the past ten years. Its three sequences of poems attend to the particulars of place and time, while ranging beyond them to gather fragments of linguistic and historical knowledge that throw easy ideas of "place" and "time" into question. Edwards' work transcends poetic license, elevating the writing beyond mere poetic concerns to a larger human scale.

arc of light / dark matter by Charles Alexander A Segue Book: 80pp. \$8.00



### SUN & MOON

Numbers and Tempers: Poems 1966–1986 by Ray DiPalma

120pp. \$11.95

DiPalma's poetry is a carefully chiselled creation of experience that is at once aural, tactile, and visual. He composes with what Jackson Mac Low has described as "precision and surprise and no nonessentials. Gists and Piths." DiPalma's language creates a landscape of the familiar at the edge of being. In his poetry each chair, table, and bed is revealed as an animate force filled with the potentiality of our imaginations. This book shows the fascinating trajectory his poetics have followed over these two decades.

### Eternal Sections by Tom Raworth 72pp. \$9.95

Tom Raworth's poetry is at once narratively based and radically disjunctive, a writing that at every moment seems to be pushing away from the line previous but suddenly snaps back into a logical whole and transforms the meaning and the reader's experience of the poem itself. Raworth is recognized as one of the major British poets of the 20th century.

# Earthlight by André Breton

178pp. \$12.95 (translated by B. Zavatsky and Z. Rogow)

Written to friends and fellow Surrealists such as Picasso, Derain, Desnos, Picabia, Reverdy and Ernst, the poems in this collection date from 1919 to 1936, the great period of Surrealist writing. The range of poetic forms, from the early collage compositions to the "Five Dreams" of Earthlight and the incantatory, feverish love poem "Free Union," reveals Breton's compositional methods and styles.

Pieces o' Six Jackson Mac Low 192pp. \$11.95


Jackson Mac Low's rich and strange prose masterpiece is by turns (and simultaneously) essaic, poetic, scholarly and anecdotal. Its emotional resonances and range of subject matter are startling and unique. From a "piece" about Nazi collaborators to a poetic relation of the effects of small ailments and little problems with large consequences to an aphoristic set of sentences linked by key words, Mac Low explores language in all its forms, in its most private and public usages. Includes computer graphics by Anne Tardos.

### The End by Fanny Howe 90pp, \$9.95

In this new volume Howe pushes her writing to the edges of her previous socially committed work, exploring larger-than-life issues of love, sexuality, death, and eschatology. This is poetry for believers and particularly for doubters; a poetry for the human race, stumbling through life, given a new day by the experience of each.

The latest installment of Silliman's massive "The Alphabet" is a masterful mix of personal, social and linguistic minutiae. That's what his many attentive readers have come to expect from him; but *Toner* is also an essay-by-example on the ways that punctuation, type case and enjambment can affect the reading of a poem. Silliman's formal concerns aren't static literary values—they lead us back to the matter and structure of the world. "When it's complete . . . 'The Alphabet' will find its place among the enduring masterworks of the 20th century"—Kevin Killian.

This is a poem with photographs by the author which "scatters literary criticism, drama and the photographic index across a wilderness of everyday language like love" (Susan Howe). "Leslie Scalapino's writing practice is a close and worldly work, 'the explanation of the explanation,' the unfolding implications of the intimate world of clauses and images, their orders: charged orders of the phenomenal world, the visual and verbal language becoming them" (Norma Cole).

### The Quietist

Fanny Howe, \$8.00

A book of poems illustrated by Italo Scanga. "Fanny Howe's writing is a form of active, attentive waiting. # spaces in the light said to be where one/ comes from by Stephen Ratcliffe 104pp. \$9.50

"A beautiful poem of water and light, music and thought. Its 88 semi-autonomous parts—each of 22 lines punctuated as a single sentence—convincingly connect phrases and clauses that would otherwise seem disjunct. Remarkably fluid—'musical' in every sense—they encompass (to quote Ratcliffe's luminous study of Campion's songs) a 'multiplicity of relationships among parts and patterns whose simultaneous likeness and unlikeness pull them simultaneously together and apart' "—Jackson Mac Low.

### TENDER BUTTONS

### Lawn of the Excluded Middle by Rosmarie Waldrop 72pp. \$7.00

This book is a continuation of the project begun in Waldrop's brilliant The Reproduction of Profiles. It experiments with and investigates questions of the "feminine" as it pertains to writing and thought. "Waldrop's work will not take things for granted. . . . ### The Fast by Hannah Weiner 48pp. \$6.

The Fast contains the first of four early journals (1970–73) that depict the development of clairvoyance from feeling and seeing auras, to seeing pictures, and finally the slow development of seeing words. "There is not one iota of the self-pitying, the diaristic, or the introspective in this work—it speaks its account with economic direct-

ness and clarity. . . . The text unrolls its logical illogic in a suggestive stream of improbable lucidity"—Johanna Drucker.

### **BURNING DECK**

### The Rebirth of the Older Child by Brita Bergland 64pp. \$8, \$15 signed

Bergland's poems fuse a sophisticated, Wittgensteinian sense of language games with a prediliction for the "rural voice," the "wacky grandeur" of everyday life on a farm. The poems celebrate language as resurrection in the hands of the politically forgotten and emotionally uncalled for, all seen through the metaphor of the haystack. The results are provocative, sometimes very funny and certainly all her own.

# The Garment In Which No One Had Slept

With precision and exquisite craftsmanship, Rehm's work charts the movement of a mind toward the point where thinking leaves the ready groove and strikes out into the unmapped. ### The Nonconformist's Memorial by Susan Howe 192pp. \$12.95

The Nonconformist's Memorial gathers four long sequences that underscore Howe's reputation as one of America's leading poets. Howe is a poet of language in history whose work resonates back through Melville, Dickinson, and Shelley to the 17th-century Metaphysicals and Puritans (the nonconformism of the title), and forward through the most advanced thought and literature of today. For Howe, "Melville's Marginalia" is the essential poem in this collection, an approach to an elusive and allusive mind through Melville's own reading and the notations in his library books. This, says Howe, is "Language a wood for thought."

### S\*PeRM\*\*K\*T

### STATION HILL

Coat of Arms by Chris Tysh 64pp. \$9.95

But the very fact that we call them 'devices' makes them vulnerable to another realm, the poetic, where prerogatives can (and, as Chris Tysh believes, should) be rethought and ultimately dispersed. Tysh's writing doesn't say we shouldn't be somewhere, but it acts out a being there in a different (gorgeous and unpunishing) way. Coat of Arms is a disarming work, and absolutely lovely"-Lyn Hejinian.






