


LITTLE BOOKS/INDIANS by Hannah Weiner

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

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Smoke and Other Early Stories, by Djuna Barnes




This first book by the co-founder of Co-Accident and E-Pod, Writing consists of two works: 59, a series of linguistic constellations composed with the aid of templates, & slugs, constructed from linotype mistakes prior to meltdown. Both pieces exist in simultaneous realms of visual activity and sound/performance realization.

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



Volume Four Our largest assembling, the main offering for 1981 is a 150 page perfectbound issue from *Open Letter* which includes work by Eigner, Grenier (on Creeley), Acker, Mac Low (on "reader"/"perceiver"-centered writing), Perelman, Darragh (on Howe), Watten (on Surrealism), Benson, Lansing, Heidseck, de Campos, Boone, Sondheim, Burns, &&. 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
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
